WHEN CHILDREN BITE POLICY

Adopted August 2025

Biting is a behaviour that can be upsetting for parents, children, and practitioners. It is important to remember that babies and young children are not born with the ability to self-regulate. They rely on adults to support them through **co-regulation** as they learn to manage their emotions and behaviours.

Biting is a common stage in early childhood, and clear guidelines are in place to manage incidents consistently and calmly.

Responding to a Biting Incident

- First priority: The child who has been bitten will be comforted immediately.
- Managing the child who has bitten: Wherever possible, another adult will support the child who has bitten. If only one adult is present, the bitten child will always receive attention first.
- Calm response: The child who has bitten will be dealt with calmly.

 Overreacting may reinforce biting if it is attention-seeking behaviour.

Understanding the Behaviour

- Young children are sensory learners, and biting may be linked to sensoryseeking behaviour or unmet needs.
- Staff will record the **antecedents** (what happened before) and carry out observations to identify possible triggers.
- Information will be shared with parents/carers so that we can work together to plan strategies to support the child.

Supporting Both Children

 Once the immediate upset has been managed, staff may bring the children together to help the child who has bitten understand the impact of their actions.

- The child may see the hurt they have caused and may naturally express remorse. While we do not insist on apologies, staff may role-model by saying "I'm sorry this happened" to comfort the injured child.
- Where appropriate, the child who has bitten may be encouraged to help care for the other child (e.g., fetching a cold compress).

Ongoing Concerns

- If biting occurs repeatedly, staff will monitor the behaviour to identify any patterns or triggers.
- Findings will be discussed confidentially with parents/carers of the child who is biting, and strategies will be put in place to offer consistent support.

Recording & Communication

- All incidents will be recorded.
- The child who has been bitten will be entered into the accident book.
- Both sets of parents/carers will be informed confidentially at collection.
